

Relative Clauses

A 'clause' is part of a sentence. A defining relative clause makes it clear who or what you are talking about in a sentence.

Ex: The man who lives next door had an accident.

Relative clauses begin with relative pronouns:

who for peoplewhen for timewhich for things and animalswhere for locationswhose for possessions

In less formal English we often use that instead of who or which.

The police caught the student that robbed the bank.
