PLOT

Erin Brockovich is a young divorced mother of three small children who finally finds a job in a lawyer's office. She convinces Ed Masry to hire her. When she finds evidence that PG&E, a huge energy utility, is polluting the countryside with its careless waste water elimination, she convinces her boss and all the people in the area to sue for damages. Based on a true story, the film shows how a woman with no money or power, but convinced of the righteousness' of her cause, manages to get the support and evidence needed to take on a powerful American company and win.

ANGUAGE

Erin is not highly educated (although extremely intelligent and ethical), and she lives in lower class surroundings so her language reflects this. It is peppered throughout with four-letter words and epithets – some of which are supremely original and funny. Her language is always ironic, slangy and simple, like that of the people around her. The accents are Far West (the setting is California) and Midwest (Erin comes from Wotchita, Kansas).

There are numerous technical, medical, chemical and legal terms like "hexavalent chromium" which would not be familiar even to a native speaker untrained in the subjects, but they are explained in the context of the film. There are many colloquial, idiomatic expressions which are very colorful and amusing – American language at its most interesting!
