Classroom activities & skills

At the end of the course, the student should be able to:

- understand the main ideas of some authentic texts and all level-adapted texts on a range of subjects particularly referred to a professional context
- interact spontaneously with native speakers
- write a clear, structured text on a variety of subjects, particularly referred to a professional context
- express a point of view and arguing for and against different opinions

The teaching will propose the following activities:

- **grammatical revision:** consolidation and extension of intermediate grammatical forms and structures
- **vocabulary extension:** the reading of authentic and adapted texts drawn from textbooks, newspapers and the Internet
- **written assignments:** tasks will be set to develop individually or in small groups, at times requiring presentation to the whole class; editing professional documents (formal letter, e-mail, blog)
- **reading comprehension:** presentation and analysis of texts in Italian indicated by the professor
- **oral interaction:** discussion of concepts relating to everyday and professional topics
- **mock exams and testing:** exercises taken from past exams and also full mocks will be given and corrected either in class or at home by the professor

Self-Study activities & skills

Learning a language and effective preparation for the exam require regular attendance of lessons and constant effort also in terms of autonomous study. For this purpose, a series of activities to be done in the textbook (see adopted and suggested texts) and the self-study modules available on the [e-learning](#) platform have been included in the table below. In the Libraries students can also find the material provided by the teacher in the classroom and some previous exam papers.

It is suggested to dedicate 3-5 hours weekly for independent study.

Exam content and description

The exam is scored out of a maximum of 30 points, which will go into the calculation of your grade point average, and evaluates your ability to:

- understand spoken texts of a certain length and complexity and take notes to provide reformulated answers
- write a text following the recommended text style
- oral interaction: presentation and discussion
- demonstrate your knowledge of the language, by correctly using a range of vocabulary and grammatical structures

Exam Terms

The exam consists of **two compulsory** parts: a **written test** and an **oral test**.

In order to sit for exams, both written and oral, it is necessary to enroll for the exam through Punto Blu. Both tests must be successful for the exam to be recorded.

For the **written test**:

- the written test can be taken again before sitting for the oral test
- the handing in of the exam paper makes the previous written exam taken null

For the **oral test**:

- it can only be taken if the written test has been successful (minimum mark: 18/30)
- it can only be taken within the validity terms of the written test (see section **Written Exam, Validity**)
- it involves the preparation of the content and any materials as indicated in the program (see section **Oral exam, Test**)
- once the oral exam is passed, the oral mark is added to the written one to define the final grade (see section **Oral Exam, Final grade**)

Written Exam

First part	Listening to one or more passages – monologue, dialogue, discussion, survey – containing data, opinions, descriptions, explanations	
Objective	Check candidates' ability to: - understand a listening passage and make brief notes on the information contained therein; - report accurately in a structured written form the information and opinions expressed, possibly adding also a personal comment

Second part	- Writing - Ability to write a text according to instructions given

Validity	it is valid for the 3 subsequent oral exams, and it is also valid for the subsequent 12 months but there is a penalty that must be paid (see <i>Oral Exam, Final grade</i>)	

Oral Exam

Objective	Discussion of the topic presented led by the examiners using ad hoc questions
Skill	Presentation and discussion, reading and comprehension
Test	<p>-The student presents at least an article (min. 700 – max. 1500 words) taken from the Italian press and approved by the teacher prior to the exam</p> <p>-The examiner will also asks the candidate to read and discuss another topic, chosen by them and taken from the subjects contained in the set textbook.</p> <p>It is indispensable that the above-mentioned items are prepared thoroughly for the oral exam and students are advised to prepare themselves well in advance of the date. Duration	15 minutes
Dictionary	Dictionaries are not allowed
Final grade	<p>The oral exam can only be taken once you have passed the written exam. Students will be assessed in terms of their practical ability to communicate. During the oral exam marks can be added to or subtracted from the written exam result in the following way:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • by +3 or -3, if the oral exam is passed within the 3 oral exams subsequent to the written exam; • by +1 or -3, if the oral exam is passed after the first 3 subsequent oral exams, but still by 12 months subsequent to the written exam

As an alternative to the Bocconi exam, students may choose to register one of the [international certifications recognized by the University](#). The achieved result is converted into a number grade out of a possible thirty and is registered in the academic career

Additional Points

The assessment of language skills depends both on the result of the final exam and on marks awarded during the year:

- 1. Positive participation in the course and completion of self-study activities**
- 2. Partial Exam**
- 3. The exam passed the first time it is taken**

Points are registered at the same time the oral exam is passed

2. Partial Exam

Objective	Evaluate progress in language learning
Test	Skills: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Grammar – Grammar exercises in the following formats: multiple choice answers, sentence completion, transformation• Vocabulary exercises in the following formats: sentence completion, cloze test, multiple choice answers and possibly a short writing
Duration	60 minutes
Dictionary	Dictionaries are not allowed
Maximum points awardable	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 0.5 thirtieth is awarded on the condition that students pass their final written and oral exam within the first or second scheduled exam session
Assignment of points	Determined by the teacher after a “pass” grade has been achieved
Validity	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• From January to February immediately following the course. These months are included
Note	The exam is open to all students, both attenders and non-attenders enrolled in the first year of their Degree course. The test takes place once a year, in June at the end of the first semester. Students must enroll for the exams at the Punto Blu.

3. The exam passed the first time it is taken

Objective	Reward students who sit for the exam only when really well prepared
Maximum points awardable	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 0.5 thirtieth
Assignment of points	Automatically, when the student registers for the written exam and hands in the exam for the first time, and passes it (minimum 18/30) and take the oral exam on the first available date subsequent to the written exam
