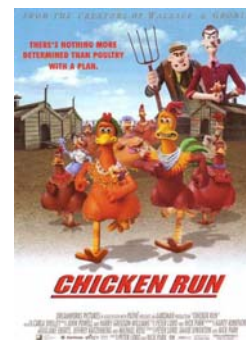

Chicken Run

PLOT

This film is a homage to the World War II prison films from the 1950s and 1960s and is set in a POW camp-like chicken farm in England. The film brings to mind "Animal Farm" where the farm animals consistent in their fight for survival, collectively devise a triumphant plan of escape from the humans who control their ill fate. In this case, chickens run away from being killed and made into pies. Ginger (the starring hen) attempts to lead the chickens to safety and is then blessed with the arrival of Rocky (the starring rooster voiced by Mel Gibson) who takes over and trains the chickens for their final escape demonstrating how hard work, strong beliefs and perseverance result in a triumphant ending against the evils of existence.

LANGUAGE
